Forbes Named JHS President

The Jewish Historical Society of Greater New Haven has elected Robert Pierce Forbes as its new president. Forbes succeeds Albert Harary, who had served as president for the last three years.

Forbes has lived in New Haven since 1987, when he came to pursue a Ph.D. at Yale University. He and his wife, Joanne Foodim, M.D., have been members of Congregation Beth El-Keser Israel for more than 20 years. Their children, Rachel, 26, and David, 25, are graduates of Ezra Academy.

Forbes has taught history at the University of Connecticut, Wesleyan, Rutgers, and Yale, and served as the founding associate director of Yale's Gilder Lehrman Center for the Study of Slavery, Resistance, and Abolition from 1998 to 2006. He specializes in U.S. history from the Revolution to the Civil War, focusing on the impact of slavery on the development of American institutions.

Forbes is the author of "The Missouri Compromise and it's aftermath: Slavery and the Meaning of America," and his most recent published work is "We Here Highly Resolve: The End of Compromise and the return of Revolutionary Time," in the anthology "Conceived in Liberty: Perspectives on Lincoln at Gettysburg."



Forbes's first priority as president of the Jewish Historical Society is to build membership. In this 40th anniversary year, he has pledged to enroll 40 new members under 40 years old.

Recent Happenings

On Thursday, **November 3rd, 2016**, The Jewish Historical Society partnered with the JCC in sponsoring, during Jewish Book Month, a review of "The Inventor's Dilemma", a biography written by David Gerber on the life of his Father, H. Joseph Gerber, detailing his brilliant career as inventor and business magnate.

In 1940, Joseph and his Mother escaped Nazi Austria immigrating to the United States, (his Father perished in the Holocaust). He enrolled at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute and while learning English and holding down a part and fulltime jobs, was able to devise and later patent

the Gerber Variable Scale called the greatest engineering tool since the slide ruler.

He went on to pioneer important developments in an amazing range of industries –from computer aided design (CAD), apparel (Gerber Cutter) for cutting tall stacks of cloth accurately and quickly, shoe making, printing, and the evolution of his company to a global supplier of intelligent manufacturing systems. In his early invention of the Gerber Scale he made use of a

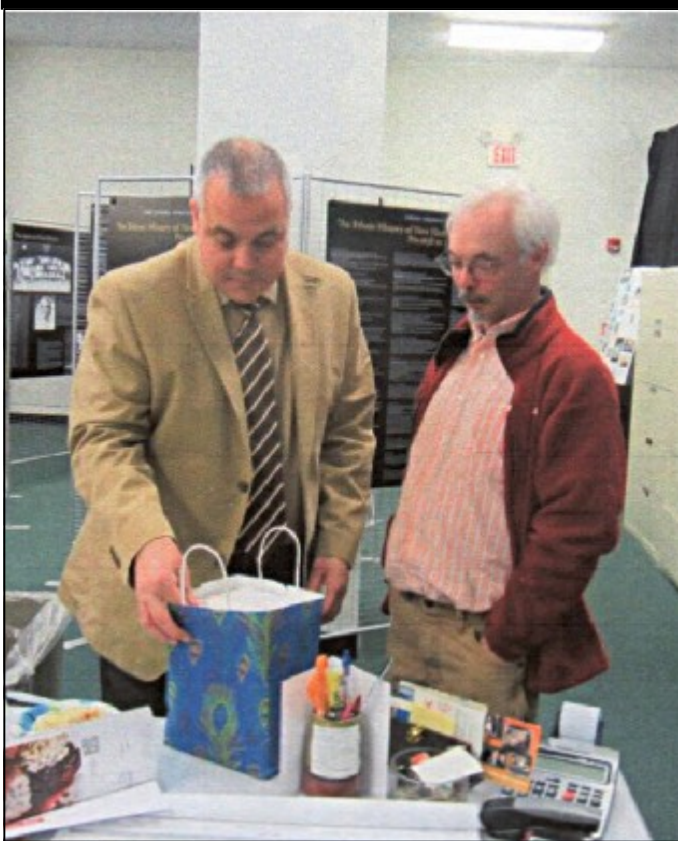
Meet the President

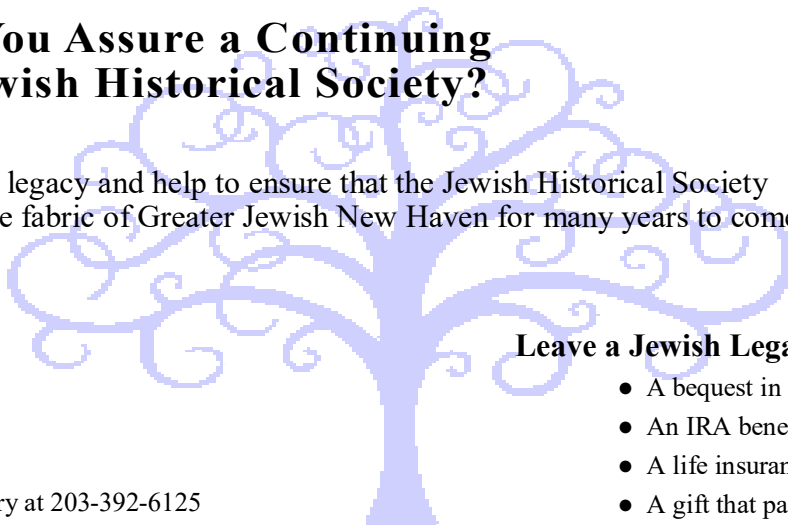
